## WHAT MAKES A GREAT TEACHER?

This was one of the headlines in the recent *Educational Leadership* magazine. The article then went on to interview several prominent educators to get their opinion on that question. What piqued my interest was the introduction to the article in which the author outlines his journey on the road to his teaching career. He noted that teaching was not his first area of interest and only got into because he thought it would be a neat experience for a couple of years. Little did he realize then that teaching would become his life-long passion. I, too, started in much the same way. I never intended to become a teacher – it was never on my radar screen – I only got into it because I was getting married and needed something to do to earn an income until something ‘better’ came along. Little did I realize then that God was leading me through an incredible journey so that over twenty years later, I can’t imagine doing anything else. However, as I read through this article and as I reflect on my first few years, I am more and more convinced that effective teachers are made – not born. People don’t start on the teaching path with their teaching skills fully developed – they need to work at it with patience and diligence and a lot of guidance. Thus, teaching is a skill that can, on the one hand, be taught and honed, and on the other hand, can also be diminished and weakened.

So... what makes a great teacher? Some secular educators provide these answers:

Humility – understanding that as a teacher, we don’t know everything but are willing to learn.

Excited about Learning – great teachers ignite a passion for learning, who pique student’s curiosity about a subject and provide the learning tools needed to engage this curiosity.

Reflective – great teachers constantly examine and re-examine what they are teaching and how they are teaching it, striving to maximize their effect on the students.

Designing lessons that engage students in a journey of learning.

All of these answers certainly point to effective teaching – in a Christian school or in a public school. And... all of these point to skills (well, maybe not the first one) that any teacher with motivation and desire can work on.

At the same time, however, when our graduating students are surveyed and asked the question, What makes a great teacher, they are known to respond like this: A great teacher is someone who loves the Lord, who cares for His children. A great teacher is someone who can engage students in unfolding God’s creative handiwork and deepen their understanding of His will for their lives. Praise God that our school has these kind of teachers! For I am also convinced that when teachers begin with this perspective and work hard to cultivate it, the rest – humility, excited, reflective – will also be worked on and will flow from it.

## CHAPEL CONCEPTS

### Chapel Speaker: Pastor Tony Mann from Marantha Christian Reformed Church

Pastor Mann talked about Advent on December 14. He specifically spoke of the hope that we have because of Jesus' coming to earth. He defined hope as the belief that something good is going to happen in the future. The reason that we today can have hope is because of God's reliability. God has promised, in Romans 8 and other places, that sin will eventually be removed, and the curse of sin will be gone. This is because of Jesus. Jesus came to the earth, and showed us in His life how we can live in community with one another, and purchased, through His death and resurrection, forgiveness for our sins. As Pastor Mann concluded, we can have hope because Jesus came to help us.

### Chapel Speaker: Pastor Ralph Light from Fort Macleod Alliance Church

On January 18, Pastor Light spoke on Titus 3:3-8. He drew three main points from that passage. First, we are declared righteous by God's grace. In light of the alternative, we want God to declare us righteous. This led to his second point: there is nothing we can do that can convince God to declare us righteous. Our works or our merits are not the basis for our being declared righteous. Titus 3:3 describes our depraved condition prior to God's grace. Most world religions have it as their goal to try to somehow earn God's approval, but in our own strength, no matter our religion or heritage, we simply cannot earn God's righteousness. One person that we can look to for an example is Abraham. Through Abraham's faith, he was declared righteous simply because he believed in and trusted God. His basis for being declared righteous was his faith, and not any good works that he had done. This led to Pastor Light's third point: if we trust in God, we should then devote ourselves to doing good. This is the work that we as Christians are called to do. Our good works should be the *effect* of our being declared righteous, but they can never be the *cause*.

# Kaitlin's Wish

If you were granted one wish, what would you wish for? In the summer of 2009, just after her 16<sup>th</sup> birthday, Kaitlin Boyda was told she had an incurable brain tumour. Children's Wish Foundation informed Kaitlin she was eligible for a wish. (The Children's Wish Foundation is a national non-profit organization dedicated to fulfilling a wish for children who have been diagnosed with a life-threatening illness.) Kaitlin's family wondered what she would choose, and presented her with ideas but she remained undecided. She said her wish couldn't be about her, it needed a purpose.

In December of 2010, Kaitlin contacted the Children's Wish Foundation. She informed them she wanted her wish to impact the children involved with Compassion Canada's ministry. (Compassion Canada is a non-profit organization who is committed to "eliminating the root causes of poverty for children around the globe".) Compassion Canada is coordinating a total of 21 water projects in Uganda, providing clean water sources to 6,300 Compassion-registered children, in addition to the 30,000 people in surrounding communities.

Kaitlin's wish was granted when the Children's Wish Foundation presented Compassion with a cheque on Kaitlin's behalf to be used to provide a project in Uganda with safe, clean drinking water. Not only will the children and their families enjoy clean, safe drinking water, but so will the community in which they live.

Kaitlin is an important part of the ICHS family, and we as a school community want to get behind this project and support it. Please prayerfully consider giving to this cause, and if you feel led to give, please go to [www.compassion.ca/kaitlinswish](http://www.compassion.ca/kaitlinswish) or you can leave your donation at the school office, and we will forward it on to Compassion Canada.

Pray for the water project and all of those whose lives will be impacted. Pray for our school community as we join together to spread the love of Jesus throughout the world.

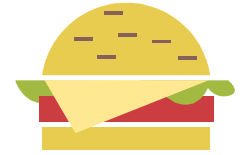

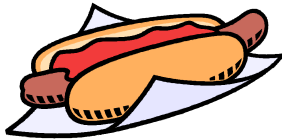
